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How To Maintain

Your Joy



It's the Holy Spirit in us
Who produces and maintains
the joy that exuberates from us.

PEOPLE OFTEN CONFUSE joy with happiness, thinking they are the same thing. They are not. Happiness depends on external things. We're happy when we get a new car or a new house. We're happy when our favorite sports team wins a game, or we come across a sale at a clothing store.

Joy comes from within and is not based on circumstances. It is something we choose to express. And it's an attitude that comes from the Holy Spirit.

Galatians 5:22–23 (NLT) says, *“The Holy Spirit produces this kind of fruit in our lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.”* With the Holy Spirit working in us, it's easy to practice the fruit of the Spirit. He is the One Who enables us to have joy.

For many of us, however, our joy thermometer is based on what is happening in our lives. If we have a bad day or people at work frustrate us, we lose our joy.

When that happens, it is evident that the Holy Spirit is not working in us. If He were, we would have joy despite our circumstances. It's the Holy Spirit in us Who produces and maintains the joy that exuberates from us.

How does He do that? John 15:1–2 (NLT) says, *“I am the true grapevine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch of mine that doesn't produce fruit, and he prunes the branches that do bear fruit so they will produce even more.”*

For us to produce the fruit of the Spirit—joy included—we have to be pruned. The word prune means “to cut away what is unwanted.” I call these unwanted things “joy stealers.” By pruning these things from our lives, we can maintain joy.

NUMBER ONE: DISCONTENTMENT

Sometimes we get discontented with where we are in life. We thought we would reach our goals sooner. We thought we would live in a bigger house, own a new car, or be in a better financial situation.

Paul says in Philippians 4:11 (NLT), *“For I have learned how to be content with whatever I have.”* That doesn't mean we have to stay where we are. But it does mean that wherever we are in life, we need to be content. God knows what He is preparing us for, but His plan rarely has shortcuts. It's not a microwave plan; it's a crock-pot plan.

NUMBER TWO: OFFENSE

Joy can evaporate when conflict between ourselves and another person goes on and on. When offense occupies our minds and emotions, we have little time left over for God. Hebrews

12:14 encourages us to “work at living in peace with everyone” (NLT). We must choose not to get offended. If we do not let go of offense, it will envelop us.

NUMBER THREE: UNFORGIVENESS

Do people hurt us? Absolutely. Do people betray us? Yes, they do. But God’s Word commands us to forgive. Is it hard to forgive? Yes. I’m not going to say it’s easy. However, unforgiveness only hurts us. It does not hurt the offender. On the other hand, forgiveness takes away the power the offender has in our life.

NUMBER FOUR: COMPARISONITIS

Comparing yourself to someone else can cause you to have low self-esteem. But guess what? God doesn’t make clones. He wants you to be you. Jeremiah 1:5 (MSG) says, “Before I shaped you in the womb, I knew all about you. Before you saw the light of day, I had holy plans for you.” So don’t copy somebody else’s plans because God hasn’t given you the grace for those plans.

NUMBER FIVE: ANXIETY

God is in control, and He will take care of us. We don’t need to be anxious about anything. Philippians 4:6 (NLT) says, “Don’t worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and thank him for all he has done.” Our Heavenly Father is working for us and will cause all things—regardless of what they are—to turn around for our good. Life will always bring us challenges. The Apostle Paul never lost his joy in any of the trials he faced. What was his secret?

1. **Paul continually grew in the Lord.** Philippians 3:8 (AMPC) says, “I count everything as loss compared to the possession of the priceless privilege (the overwhelming preciousness, the surpassing worth, and supreme advantage) of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord and of progressively becoming more deeply and intimately acquainted with Him.”

2. **Paul forgot the past.** “One thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things

which are ahead, I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus” (Phil. 3:13–14 NKJV).

3. **Paul did not let circumstances move him.** Paul knew by the Holy Spirit that chains and tribulations awaited him in Jerusalem. But he said, “None of these things move me” (Acts 20:24 NKJV).

4. **Paul purposely declared joy and dwelt on proper thoughts.** He said, “Rejoice in the Lord always. Again I will say, rejoice!” (Phil. 4:4 NKJV). And he added, “Finally, . . . whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy—meditate on these things” (Phil. 4:8 NKJV).

When joy stealers come, we must meditate on the good things. And we must be full of God’s Word. So instead of talking about what is happening, we must let the Word come out of our mouths. When bills are piling up, we say, “My God will supply—not just part—but all of my needs according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus” (Phil. 4:19).

When sickness attacks, we boldly declare, “By His stripes, I am healed!” (Isa. 53:5). When fear tries to grip us, we tell the devil, “God has not given me a spirit of fear” (2 Tim. 1:7). The enemy can’t steal our joy when the Word comes out of our mouth and the Holy Spirit bubbles up from inside us. For it is His joy that fills our joy!♥

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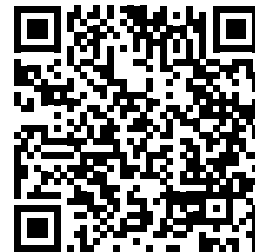

ACTS CHAPTER 14 records the story of a crippled man whose destiny was changed after he came in contact with the Apostle Paul. This man had been lame from birth and had never walked a day in his life. But after hearing Paul preach the message of Christ, he was healed of a lifelong infirmity.

By examining how this man was healed, we can learn simple steps we can take to receive healing for ourselves.

ACTS 14:7-10 (NKJV)

7 And they [Paul and Barnabas] were preaching the gospel there.

8 And in Lystra a certain man without strength in his feet was sitting, a cripple from his mother's womb, who had never walked.

9 This man heard Paul speaking. Paul, observing him intently and seeing that he had faith to be healed,

10 said with a loud voice, "Stand up straight on your feet!" And he leaped and walked.

From these verses, we can see that both Paul and the crippled man did three things before this healing took place.

First, Paul preached the Gospel. He didn't preach his opinion or his politics or give a motivational speech. His message was simple: Jesus Christ, and Him crucified (1 Cor. 2:1-2).

Although Paul experienced a lot of persecution for the Gospel's sake, he did not allow persecution to stop him from

preaching that Gospel. In Acts chapter 13, we see that Paul and Barnabas were expelled from Antioch in Pisidia for preaching Christ. Instead of quitting, they just shook the dust off their feet and traveled to Iconium (Acts 13:51), and then to Lystra and Derbe (Acts 14:6), where Paul continued to preach the Word of God boldly.

Second, as Paul ministered the Word, he perceived that the crippled man had faith to be healed (Acts 14:9). This indicates that Paul was probably well into his message when he saw a change in the man's face.

You may have had a similar experience. Have you ever tried to explain something to someone, and you could tell that the other person just wasn't getting it? But you kept talking until it seemed as if a light bulb turned on inside him. You knew the moment he understood what you were saying. It appears that this is

what happened to Paul; he could tell when the lame man had faith to be healed.

Third, Paul commanded the man to get up and walk. He encouraged the man to act on his faith.

These three steps were Paul's part to play in the man's miracle. However, the crippled man was not healed on Paul's faith alone. He also had a part in receiving his miracle. And if he hadn't done his part, he would not have been healed.

What three things did the crippled man do?

HEAR

First, he had to hear the Gospel message being preached. Romans 10:17 says that *“Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.”* If we don’t know what God’s Word says about healing, then we can’t have faith that God will heal us.

BELIEVE

Second, after the crippled man heard the Word proclaimed, the scriptures tell us that he had faith to be healed (Acts 14:9). We all have free wills, and we can accept or reject the things we hear. This man chose to *believe* the words of Paul and accept the message of the cross. If he had rejected Paul’s words, he would have remained a cripple.

ACT

Third, the crippled man had to *act* on what Paul said. Hearing the Word preached was not enough to get the crippled man walking. Neither was having faith to be healed. Many people have faith, but they are not healed because they don’t *act* on their faith.

When Paul said to the crippled man, *“Stand up straight on your feet!”* the man could have said, “I can’t. I’ve been lame since birth.” But he didn’t do that. Although there was no way in the natural for him to stand on his feet, he immediately “leaped and walked” on Paul’s command. Only when he took the initiative and acted on Paul’s command did the healing power of God go into his limbs and strengthen his lifeless legs.

The healing of the crippled man at Lystra outlines three simple steps we can take to receive healing: hear, believe, and act. When we dare to act on the Word of God that we have heard and believed, the seemingly impossible will suddenly become possible! And like the crippled man at Lystra, we will rise and walk!

FAITH IN ACTION

Faith Is Now

Receiving anything from God is about being in faith. And faith is “now.” In other words, it’s present tense. Long before anything has perceptibly changed, faith counts it done. Faith says, “I have it now.”

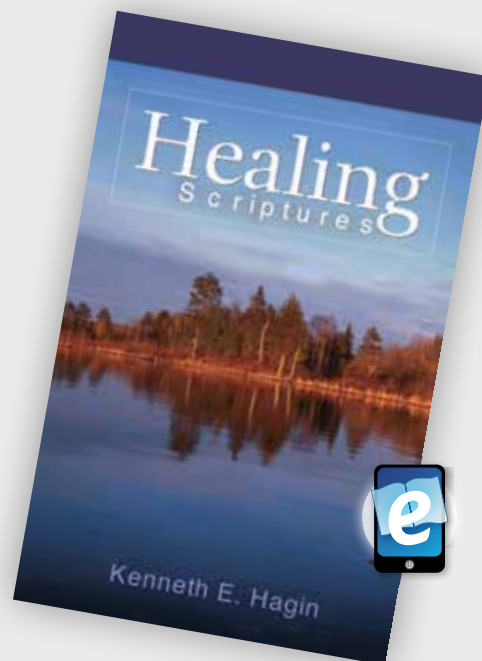
Hope, on the other hand, is future tense. And unfortunately, many people think they’re in faith when they’re really in hope. They expect to see their prayers answered in the future. Hope says, “I will have it someday.”

How do you move from hope to faith? It’s simple: “Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God” (Rom. 10:17 NKJV). Take time to read and meditate on scriptures that pertain to your need. Listen to sermons by quality ministers preaching on that subject. Keep doing this until you can say, “I have it now.”

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What Are You **Focused On?**

PHILEMON 1:6 (NKJV) SAYS, *“That the sharing of your faith may become effective by the acknowledgment of every good thing which is in you in Christ Jesus.”* The key to effective faith isn’t just about speaking; it’s about focusing on the good things in us in Christ.

We’ve been taught that we have faith that moves mountains, and we’ve learned how to speak to those mountains. But there’s a danger in becoming too focused on the mountain itself. When we constantly speak to the problem and meditate on it, our focus shifts from God to the problem.

For example, if someone is battling cancer and they constantly say, “Cancer, you’ve got to go. Cancer, leave. Cancer, in Jesus’ Name be gone,” it can lead to their mind being filled with nothing but thoughts of cancer. Then their focus becomes the problem, not the solution.

Our faith becomes more effective when we focus on what Jesus has done in us, rather than on our challenges. The mountain isn’t our Lord—Jesus is.

Our faith becomes ineffective when we give more attention to the mountain than to God. It’s easy to share our struggles on social media or with others, but what if we focused on God’s promises instead? Luke 6:45 says that “out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks.” What we focus on will come out of us and shape our words, actions, and outcomes.

Life happens. We don’t deny storms and mountains exist, but they don’t hold ultimate power over us.

Our focus determines whether we live in victory or defeat.

Philippians 4:8 (TPT) reminds us, *“Keep your thoughts continually fixed on all that is authentic and real, honorable and admirable, beautiful and respectful, pure and holy, merciful and kind. And fasten your thoughts on every glorious work of God, praising him always.”*

We are to fasten our thoughts. Every moment of the day, instead of focusing on our struggles, we should thank God for His life and strength within us. For Christians, meditation is about what we choose to focus on. We can either rehearse our problems or rehearse God’s promises. When we focus on His Word and His goodness, our perspective changes. In trials, we can either dwell on the storm, or trust in the One Who calms it.

In the story of the three Hebrew boys in the fiery furnace, their situation was dire (Daniel chapter 3). Yet their focus wasn’t on the flames; it was on the One standing with them in the fire. They weren’t scarred because they focused on the good things—they focused on the Lord.

Song of Songs 2:15 (TPT) warns us to *“catch the troubling foxes, those sly little foxes”* that spoil the vine. These “foxes” represent the little thoughts, motives, and ideas that can ruin what God has placed in us.

One of the most dangerous foxes is letting our focus shift from God to our troubles. God has a purpose for each of us. We can’t let these little things get in our head and ruin what He has done in us.

We must take control of our thoughts. Just as a zookeeper controls when an animal in captivity eats, we control what thoughts we entertain. When a thought contrary to God’s Word comes, we don’t feed it. Instead, we must replace it with God’s truth.

Life isn’t about what we go through; it’s about how we go through it. When we focus on God, we are like a tree planted by the waters. When the enemy attacks, we can’t focus on the fire or on the drought. We must focus on God’s Word: “Greater is He that is in me,” “By His stripes I am healed,” and “The peace of God rules in my heart.”

The next time you face a challenge, ask yourself, “What am I focused on? The mountain? Or the One Who can move it?” Shift your focus to God’s goodness and the good things in you in Christ. Your faith will become effective and empower you to overcome any obstacle.♥

IT IS TIME TO **RISE UP**

God is waiting on you
to take the first step.

HAVE YOU EVER felt trapped by the challenges you face? In times of hardship, it's easy to feel hopeless and believe that victory is unattainable.

The Old Testament prophet Micah lived in dark times for Israel and Judah. Their sins were great, and Micah knew that God's judgment was near.

From Micah's perspective, the moral and spiritual condition of God's people might have looked hopeless. Yet in the midst of this situation, Micah wrote these powerful words:

MICAH 7:7-8 (NLT)

7 As for me, I look to the Lord for help. I wait confidently for God to save me, and my God will certainly hear me.

8 Do not gloat over me, my enemies! For though I fall, I will rise again. Though I sit in darkness, the Lord will be my light.

Instead of just accepting a bad situation, Micah lifted his eyes and declared his faith in his God. With God's help, he would rise above despair and destruction.

We must learn to be like Micah. When adversity comes, we must say, "I will rise and enjoy every provision that God has for me."

God has an answer for everything we face. We don't have to remain stuck where we are. We can take hold of His promises and work to change our circumstances.

THE COURAGE TO ACT

In Second Kings chapter 7, we find the story of four men who rose up in the face of an impossible situation.

Samaria was under siege by the king of Aram, and the resulting famine had left the city in a desperate situation. Outside the gates sat four lepers who asked each other, "*Why are we sitting here until we die?*" (2 Kings 7:3 NKJV).

The men realized that staying where they were meant certain death. Entering the city was not an option because they were leprous—and besides, there was no food there.

So they decided to surrender to the Aramean army, hoping for mercy. If they were killed, they reasoned, they would have died anyway (2 Kings 7:3-4).

But when the lepers rose up to do something about their situation, God took over. As darkness fell, the sickly men started walking toward the enemy's camp. But to the Arameans, it sounded like a mighty army was approaching. They fled in panic, leaving everything behind.

The lepers found the camp deserted and full of food, silver, gold, and clothing. They went from tent to tent, eating and taking whatever they wanted. Then they went back to Samaria

and reported to the gatekeepers what they had found (2 Kings 7:3–16).

Because these men decided to do something about their situation, an entire city was set free.

TAKE ACTION IN YOUR LIFE

Let me ask you this: Why are you sitting in your situation until you die? Refuse to accept sickness, bondage, poverty, or any other form of oppression.

It's time to grab hold of God's Word like a bulldog holding on to a bone. It's time to take hold of God's promises with unshakeable determination and declare, "Listen, Mr. Devil, you can't keep me down any longer. I'm going to rise above this!"

God is waiting on you to take the first step. As long as you allow the enemy to hold you back, your situation will remain the same. But if you rise up and lay claim to God's promises, your circumstances will change.

It's your move. God has already acted—He sent Jesus to earth to die on the cross and rise again in victory. When Jesus rose, every promise God made became available to those who would believe in Him, rise up, and take advantage of it.

Jesus said in John 10:10 (NKJV) that He came so we could have life and have it *"more abundantly."* An abundant life is not living on Barely-Get-Along Street. God's abundance is living on Glory Avenue and walking in the fullness of everything God has promised.

The choice is yours. Second Corinthians 6:2 (NKJV) declares, *"In an acceptable time I have heard you, and in the day of salvation I have helped you. Behold, now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation."* Your day of deliverance is here, and this promise is for you. It applies to you today just as much as it did to the Corinthians when the Apostle Paul wrote it to them.

You can possess everything God promised in His Word. Simply get into the Word, believe it, speak it, and live it—and you will experience the fulfillment of its promises.

THE SIMPLICITY OF RECEIVING

It is not hard to receive from God. Too many people make it harder than it is. Jesus did the hard part. He endured the cross, crying out, *"My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?"* (Matt. 27:46 NKJV).

It was a dark moment. It appeared that everything had been lost. The devil and his bunch were cheering. They thought they had won.

But God saw that day differently. When He watched Jesus take His last breath and descend into hell, God saw victory for humanity. He knew that in three days He would raise Jesus from the grave. And through Jesus' resurrection, God would reunite us with Himself.

The same power that raised Jesus from the dead is available to bring deliverance to your life—no matter what you are facing. But you must rise up and grab hold of it. When you do, you will see your circumstances turn around!♥

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Don't Give Up

JESUS SAID, “*IN this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world*” (John 16:33 NIV). No matter who we are, trouble is something we all face. We’re either going through it, have been through it, or will face it. The question is, what do we do when things don’t go the way we hoped?

When I first started coming to Rhema, I thought, “If I just get strong in faith, I’ll never have trouble.” But what I learned is, while we don’t reach a point where we never have trouble, we can reach a place where trouble doesn’t have us. As Charles Swindoll said, “Life is 10 percent what happens to you and 90 percent how you react to it.”

Even in the most hopeless situations, things can change. A good example is in Acts chapter 27. The Apostle Paul was being taken to Rome by ship. Despite his warnings, the crew sailed into a violent storm. Wind and waves battered the ship, and they hadn’t seen the sun or stars for days.

The 276 people on board had lost all hope—except for Paul. Paul reassured them, telling them that God had promised they would all survive, though the ship would be lost. He said, “*So, dear friends, take heart. I believe God will do exactly what he told me*” (Acts 27:25 MSG). After two weeks of stormy weather, the ship broke apart on the island of Malta, but everyone made it safely ashore.

What do you do when you survive the storm but your boat breaks apart—when your world or something in your life breaks apart? Paul was in that situation, and what did he do? He grabbed a piece of broken ship and swam to shore.

God told me, “As long as you don’t let go of what you still have, you will make it.” You may not

have everything you thought you would have. But as long as you still have a piece of it, you can make it. God doesn’t need what you don’t have. All He needs is what you’ve still got. And if you hold on to that, you’ll make it.

When Paul and everyone else reached the island, it was rainy and cold—not a fun situation. But Paul didn’t give up. He believed God. As he helped build a fire, a poisonous viper came out of a bundle of sticks and bit his hand. The people around him thought it was a sign that he was being punished. But that’s how the world thinks. We should never let what people think about us change what God says about us.

The Bible says, “*Paul shook the snake off into the fire like it was nothing*” (Acts 28:5 MSG). Later, Paul went to the house of Publius, the governor of Malta, whose father was very sick. Paul laid his snake-bitten hand on the older man, and the power of God healed him. Not only was he healed, but God used Paul to heal all the sick people on the island.

You might be going through trouble you didn’t expect. Maybe you never imagined you’d be where you are in life right now. But don’t focus on what’s wrong. Grab hold of what you still have, swim for shore, and use your “snake-bitten” hand to help someone else. God’s power won’t just bring you through—it’s going to start a revival where you are.

The devil wants you to believe it’s over. But God is giving you a new beginning. It’s not just about you making it—it’s bigger than that. It’s about the will of God working through you. The devil isn’t really after you; He’s after the will of God being fulfilled through you. If you’re in a storm, whether you caused it or someone else did, don’t give up. God can turn what was meant for your destruction into a story of deliverance.♥

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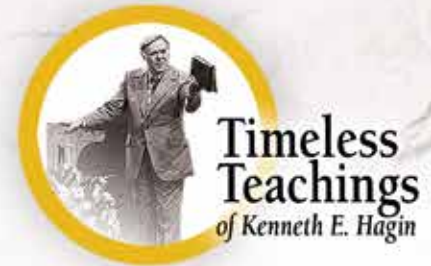


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FOLLOWING THE

INWARD WITNESS

You are a **spirit being**,
and you contact the
spiritual realm **with your spirit.**



CHRISTIANS SOMETIMES TRY to receive guidance other than how the Bible teaches. For example, the Bible never says that God will guide you through your soul. People sometimes use the words “spirit” and “soul” interchangeably, but they are not interchangeable.

We know from the Word that our soul and spirit do not refer to the same thing. Hebrews 4:12 differentiates between the two: “*The word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing even to the DIVIDING ASUNDER of SOUL and SPIRIT.*”

Paul also made a distinction among the three parts of our being: “*I pray God your whole SPIRIT and SOUL and BODY be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ*” (1 Thess. 5:23). **THE WORD CLEARLY SHOWS THAT WE ARE A SPIRIT, WE HAVE A SOUL, AND WE LIVE IN A BODY.**

The Holy Spirit abides in our spirit when we are born again.

JOHN 14:16–17

16 And I will pray the Father, and he shall give you another Comforter, that he may abide with you for ever;
17 *Even* the Spirit of truth; whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth him not, neither knoweth him: but ye know him; for he dwelleth with you, and shall be in you.

Since God dwells *in* you—in your heart or spirit—that is where He will speak to you. He does not communicate directly with your mind because He’s not in your mind. He’s in your spirit.

You are a spirit being, and you contact the *spiritual* realm with your spirit. You contact the *mental* realm with your intellect. And you contact the *physical* realm with your body.

Because God guides you through your spirit, it’s important that you allow your spirit being—the inner you—to dominate your life.

THE INWARD WITNESS

Romans 8:14 and 16 say that you are to be led by the Holy Spirit as He bears witness with your spirit. The number one way God guides all His children is by the inward witness.

Let me explain what I mean. Suppose you are praying about going in a certain direction in your life, but you get a check or a red light in your spirit. To say it another way, on the inside of you there is something that tells you no or stop. On the inside—in your heart—you don’t feel good about going in the direction you’re praying about.

That check in your spirit is the Holy Spirit telling you not to go in that direction, no matter how good the circumstances may

look. On the other hand, if you pray about a matter and you get a go-ahead signal or a velvety-like feeling in your heart, that's the witness of the Holy Spirit to proceed.

So first, God leads His children by the inward witness. Second, He leads us by the inward voice. With the inward voice, our own spirit tells us what it picks up from the Holy Ghost. God also can lead us by the more authoritative Voice of the Holy Spirit. When the Holy Ghost within us speaks, it can almost seem to be an audible voice.

Romans 8:16 says, *"The Spirit itself [Himself] beareth witness with our spirit."* Many Christians think Paul is referring to some kind of physical witness or evidence. But Paul never said the Spirit bears witness with your physical senses. No, the Holy Spirit bears witness with your spirit.

You can't base your Christian walk on your physical senses or feelings. *Feeling* is the voice of your body. *Reason* is the voice of your mind. And *conscience* is the voice of your spirit.

YOUR SPIRIT—THE INWARD YOU—HAS A VOICE; IT IS YOUR CONSCIENCE! Is your conscience a safe guide? It is if your spirit has been born again and your mind renewed by God's Word.

If you are being led by your feelings or by your physical senses instead of by your conscience, you are heading for trouble. If your mind or body dominate you, Satan can gain entrance into your life by controlling you through your feelings or senses. You can't walk by faith if you are led by your feelings.

It makes no difference if you feel like something is or isn't so. Our faith is based on God's Word, not on how we feel. Feelings can tell you something that is contrary to scripture. But the Holy Spirit will communicate to you through your spirit, and it will always be in line with the Word.

Jesus said the Holy Spirit will show you things to come (John 16:13). How will He do that? By bearing witness with your spirit. The Holy Spirit endeavors to guide you in all the affairs of life.

A biblical illustration of how the inward witness operates is found in the Book of Acts.

ACTS 27:9–10

9 Now when much time was spent, and when sailing was now dangerous, because the fast was now already past, Paul admonished *them*,

10 And said unto them, *Sirs*, I PERCEIVE that this voyage will be with hurt and much damage, not only of the lading and ship, but also of our lives.

Notice Paul didn't say, "The Lord told me." No, he said, "I perceive." Paul didn't perceive this mentally. He didn't perceive it physically through his senses. In his spirit, he had an inward witness that *"this voyage will be with hurt and much damage."*

A key principle to following the inward witness is to develop and train your spirit. How do you do that? Number one, feed on God's Word. Number two, make sure you walk in love. And number three, pray much in other tongues.

When you pray out of your spirit, you become more conscious of your spirit and of spiritual things. Supernaturally you're in direct contact with God, the Father of spirits (Heb. 12:9). If you'll develop your spirit being, after a while, you'll always know what to do.

Too many Christians spend most of their lives in the mental and physical realms. Many times we've developed our intellects at the expense of developing our hearts. Our intellects take the throne in our lives, and our spirits—which should guide us—are kept locked away in prison and not permitted to function. But even if we don't listen to our spirits, the Holy Spirit through the inward witness is always seeking to guide us.♥

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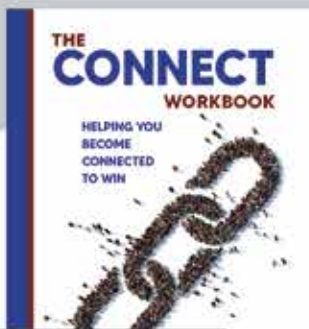
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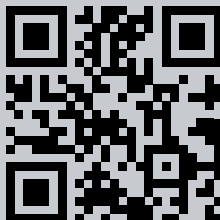
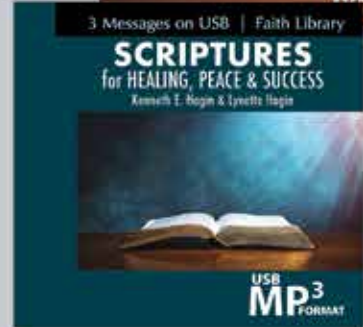

SPIRITUAL INSIGHTS FROM A POWER OUTAGE

SEVERAL YEARS AGO, I was carrying on my daily routine when suddenly that routine got interrupted. I enjoy getting up each morning to praise and worship music, spending time with God, and receiving instructions while I am getting ready. That routine started normally, but just as I had completed putting on my make-up, the lights in our house went out. That wasn't unusual and didn't alarm me at first. I thought they would come back on quickly. After waiting five minutes in the dark, I realized this was a power outage.

I had to teach at Rhema in less than an hour and still had to comb my hair, brush my teeth, and so forth. It was a cloudy day so there was no outside sunlight to navigate by. As I was meditating on how I could finish getting ready, I pondered on other things the outage affected.

My car was in the garage, and the garage door opens electrically. Our house at the time had well water, and the pump was generated by electricity. Therefore, I was without water. The gate at the entrance to our house operates electrically; therefore, I was unable to get out of our driveway. My husband had already gone to work, so he could not help me with any of the electrical things that could be done manually.

My first thought was to panic as I was clueless as to how I could navigate through this issue. My next thought was to say—let there be electricity—and it would appear suddenly, but it didn't.

Therefore, I had to come up with solutions quickly to meet my obligations. I frantically called a staff member to help me get the garage and gate opened. I found a flashlight to hold up to a mirror while I combed my hair. I brushed my teeth with bottled water, and I was on my way to class with a few minutes to spare. On the drive to the campus, I said to God, "Surely there is an illustration gained from all my inconvenience. Tell me what it is."

All of a sudden, words began to flow. He said, "The functions of the Holy Spirit in your life can be likened to electricity. Electricity produces power just as the gift of the Holy Spirit produces power in lives." I recalled the instructions Jesus left to His disciples.

"And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another Comforter (Counselor, Helper, Intercessor, Advocate, Strengthener, and Standby), that He may remain with you forever—The Spirit of Truth, Whom the world cannot receive (welcome, take to its heart), because it does not see Him or know and recognize Him. But you know and recognize Him, for He lives with you [constantly] and will be in you" John 14:16–17 (AMPC).

Jesus gave the disciples more instructions concerning the Holy Spirit. He told them not to leave Jerusalem until the Father sent them the gift He promised (Acts 1:4 NLT). Further instructions were given in verse 8: *"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere—in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth"* (NLT).

The disciples waited in Jerusalem, united in prayer, waiting for the day the Holy Spirit would come. They didn't know how long it would be before the Holy Spirit was manifested. They had no clue what to expect. But they faithfully and patiently waited. In our culture, we want everything now. Our microwaves, computers, and phone devices become too slow for us, so we trade them in for a newer model!

But look what the waiting produced: *"Suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, . . . and there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, . . . and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost and began to speak in tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance"* (Acts 2:2–4). Each one of them was transformed with a boldness to declare the Gospel of the Lord Jesus.

Have you allowed the electricity of the Holy Spirit to go out of your life? I encourage you to renew that power gift. Pray in the Spirit on a daily basis. Ephesians 6:18 (NLT) instructs us to *"Pray in the Spirit at all times and on every occasion."* If you have never received the gift of the Holy Spirit, I would encourage you to receive that gift. It will make a difference in your life.♥

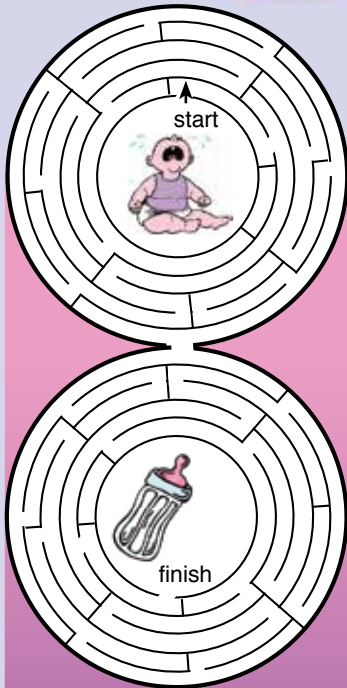

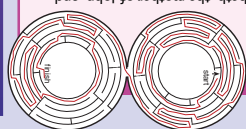

Does God really love you?

GOD'S LOVE IS the motivating force behind everything He does. His Son, Jesus, came to the earth so we might *“have life, and have it to the full”* (John 10:10 NIV). The only way to experience this fullness of life is to live in the love of God.

God's love for us is almost beyond our comprehension. We cannot fully communicate its magnitude. The Apostle Paul wanted mankind to “grasp how **wide** and **long** and **high** and **deep** the love of Christ is” (Eph. 3:18 *New International Version*). If you've ever looked over the edge of the Grand Canyon, you know it's a long way down. God's love is deeper.

At one time the SR-71 Blackbird was the fastest jet aircraft in the world. It soared up to 85,000 feet at speeds of more than 2,000 miles per hour. God's love is higher and faster.

There is no end to God's love. It reaches you wherever you are. Even when you've messed up, His love is there to pick you up, brush you off, and say, “I forgive you.”

Your Heavenly Father's love will keep and protect you when nothing else can. It will strengthen you when you feel you can't go on. It will comfort you when you've cried your last tear. When everything else has failed, the love of God will lift you out of any situation. God's love never runs out and it never fails!

You can live your life to the full when you let God's love permeate you and flow out from you. Jesus gave His followers a new command: Love one another. You are to be known by your lifestyle of love toward others (John 13:34–35). It is impossible to love unconditionally without the love of God living in you and you living in it!

To live consistently in God's love, you must do several things.

First, feed on the Word of God.

Second, before saying anything about someone else, ask, “What would love say or do?”

Third, pray for those who come against you and mistreat you.

Everyone encounters unkind, rude people. When *you* meet them, how will you respond? The only way to stay on top is to walk in love. Remember, love never fails! You *can* choose to live your life in the light of God's Word. You *can* choose to live in love!
