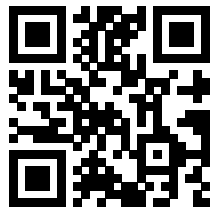

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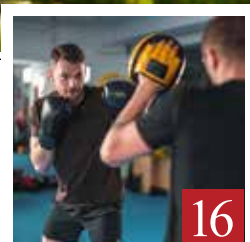
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THE “WHO” IN THE STORM

WHEN WE HEAR the word “storm,” most of us think about bad weather—wind, lightning, thunder, and rain. Growing up in Oklahoma, I learned all about storms. Tornado warnings in the middle of the night were the worst! My mom would wake me up and rush us into the closet under the stairs. I can still remember my heart pounding and the fear of not knowing what would happen. Would our house be hit this time? Would the storm

pass by? That uncertainty is what makes storms so unsettling.

Life can feel the same way. We all face storm seasons when the outcome is uncertain—a diagnosis we didn’t anticipate, a relationship that falls apart, or a sudden financial crisis. We can’t control these moments, and like the disciples in the boat with Jesus, we sometimes wonder, “Doesn’t He care that I’m drowning?” (See Mark 4:38.) But the truth is, Jesus is always with us in the storm.

There was a time in my life when I asked God the same question: “Why is this happening?” I was cleaning my bathroom one day, crying and praying, when the Lord gently spoke to my heart: “You’re asking the wrong question. Stop asking why—ask who is with you in the storm.” That moment changed everything. I realized that peace doesn’t come from understanding “why” the storm happens. It comes from knowing “who” is with me in it.

Even when we are right in the center of God’s will, storms can still come. In Mark chapter 4, the disciples were obeying Jesus when the storm struck. But Jesus was with them, calm and in control. He rebuked the wind and the waves, and peace was restored. Jesus never promised life would be free of storms, but He did promise to be our peace through every storm (John 16:33).

TAKE HEART

When Jesus told His followers to “take heart,” He was calling them to action. The Greek word for that phrase means to have unwavering courage—a bold inner confidence that comes from the Spirit of God. Taking heart isn’t something we do on our own. It’s a spiritual response that says, “I refuse to let fear lead me. I choose courage because Jesus is in my boat.”

Whatever storm you’re facing today, remember this: Jesus will be exactly what you need Him to be. He is the calm, the joy, the comfort, the focus, and the voice that steadies you through it all.

THE CALM IN THE STORM

In Mark 4:39 (NLT), Jesus said, “*Silence! Be still!*” Suddenly the wind stopped, and there was a great calm.” The same Jesus who calmed the natural storm can also calm the emotional and spiritual storms in your heart. Philippians 4:6–7 tells us that when we pray and share our needs with God, His peace will guard our hearts and minds. The first step toward peace is talking to Him about everything that concerns you. When you release your worries in prayer, you make room for His calm to take over.

THE JOY IN THE STORM

James 1:2 (NIV) encourages us to “*consider it pure joy*” when we face trials. Joy doesn’t mean pretending everything is fine; it’s choosing to rejoice because you recognize the storm is temporary. Proverbs 17:22 (NIV) states, “*A cheerful heart is good medicine.*” Even science confirms that laughter and joy promote healing in the body. Joy isn’t just a feeling—it’s a

choice. When you decide to embrace joy, you shift your focus from the storm to the Savior.

THE COMFORTER IN THE STORM

Psalms 34:18 (NIV) says, “*The Lord is close to the brokenhearted.*” Jesus is our greatest comforter. Sometimes His comfort comes through people—a friend’s text, a prayer, or a simple act of kindness. Don’t push those moments away. They are God’s way of wrapping His arms around you. And remember, you can also be His hands and feet to someone else who’s hurting. When God puts someone on your heart, reach out. Don’t just ask, “Can I help?” Simply show up and be the comfort they need.

THE FOCUS IN THE STORM

When Peter walked on the water, he was fine until he looked at the wind and waves. As soon as he took his eyes off Jesus, he began to sink (Matt. 14:30). Focus is a storm-changer. Hebrews 12:2 tells us to fix our eyes on Jesus—the Author and Finisher of our faith. He anchors our souls when emotions try to take over. When you focus on Him, your thoughts settle, your heart steadies, and your confidence returns.

THE VOICE IN THE STORM

Jesus doesn’t remain silent when you call on Him. His Word speaks to every storm you face. Whether it’s healing, provision, or peace, find what the Bible says and speak it out loud. His Word is living and powerful. When you say what He says, you release His authority into your situation. Jesus is the voice that still speaks to storms today—and they still obey Him.

We might not always understand “why” storms come, but we can always know “who” is with us during them. Jesus is our anchor. He is our calm, our joy, our comfort, our focus, and our voice. Keep your eyes on Him, and you will make it safely to the other side.

Ask yourself today, “Who is in my storm?” Take a moment to name what you need Jesus to be right now—your peace, your comfort, your joy—and call on Him to fill that role. 🙏

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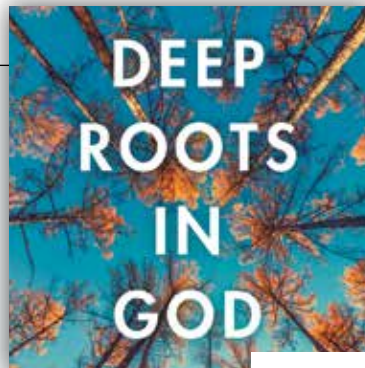
The Bible says trusting the Lord makes us like trees planted by water, with roots reaching deep (Jer. 17:8 NLT). Deep roots help resist drought and serve as stabilizers. 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NO MORE EXCUSES

WATER PARKS ARE always fun. With the water slides, tube rides, and splash pools, there's something for everyone. Watching people around the wave pool is entertaining. They can be lying by the pool, soaking up the sun. But when the bell rings to signal the next wave, they quickly jump up and run into the pool.

This reminds me of a story found in John chapter 5. It also involves a pool—the Pool of Bethesda. The Scripture tells us that many sick people were lying on the five porches around the pool. There was no bell to warn them, but every now and then an angel stirred the water. The first person to get into the pool was healed of whatever disease they had. (See John 5:1–15 NKJV.)

A man who had been sick for 38 years was lying by the Pool of Bethesda. One day, Jesus showed up and asked him, “*Do you want to be made well?*” (v. 6.)

When you really think about it, that question sounds strange. Why else would the man be lying there? Of course, he wanted to be healed. But instead of saying, “Yes, I want to be healed,” he responded, “*Sir, I have no one to put me into the pool*” (v. 7).

From his answer, we can see that the sick man wasn't looking to God for his healing. He was looking for a man to help him. Really, he was just coming up with an excuse.

Jesus paid no attention to the man's excuse. Essentially, He said, “Get up and walk” (v. 8), and the man did.

Scripture doesn't say that Jesus laid His hands on his head. The man didn't make any faith confessions. He didn't fast for 40 days and nights. He simply acted on what Jesus said.

WHAT'S YOUR EXCUSE?

The story of the man at the Pool of Bethesda mirrors what is happening in people's lives today. Instead of standing in faith and declaring the Word of God for themselves, they are waiting on others to help them.

They want their pastor to pray for them. Or they'll call every prayer line across the country, hoping someone will pray just the right prayer to get their needs met. Sometimes it seems like everyone is praying except them!

We must understand that our needs are not met by relying on someone else to pray and stand in faith for us. We can ask for what we will and it shall be given to us when we pray (John 15:7).

Christians today are not in the same position as the man by the Pool of Bethesda. We're not stuck on the side of the pool waiting for a special sign. We have the Word of God.

Our days of making excuses are over. We can't ever say, "I don't have a man to help me." We do have a man. His name is Jesus Christ.

Through Jesus' death on the cross, burial, and resurrection, we have been set free from the devil's grip. Jesus said, *"I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly"* (John 10:10 NKJV). Jesus didn't die on the cross so we could have an abundant life in one area but not in another. We

can experience an abundant life financially, physically, spiritually, emotionally, and mentally — in every area of our lives.

God gave us His Word to act on. And just like the man at the Pool of Bethesda, we need to act on that Word and get up. So let's be doers of the Word. We've been given everything we need to succeed.

The same Spirit that raised Christ from the dead lives in us. Wherever we go, we carry "the Man," the powerful Holy Spirit, with us. He's our Counselor, our Advocate, and our Healer. He helps us in every situation. We may make some really stupid choices that land us in bad places. Even then, there's nothing we can do that God can't take care of. Nothing can separate us from His love.

Stop waiting for the water to move and drop the excuses. It's time to decide that enough is enough and start acting on God's Word. It's time to get up and move forward. When you do, you'll see yourself healed and all your needs met.♥

His healing didn't show up in bed. It appeared when he followed God's Word.

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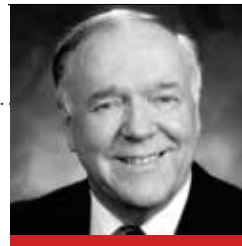
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Love and Prosperity

THE EPISTLES ARE written specifically to the Church—to born-again believers. They are of great help to us as we try to live our daily lives according to the teachings of the Lord. These letters provide specific teaching that we need to understand. They give us guidance, direction, and correction we can use in our own situations. As we read the Epistles, we can get the feeling that the author, moved by the Holy Spirit, looked down through the centuries and saw our struggles and said, “Go this direction. Follow this example.”

Here are several principles from the Epistles that show how our love walk is connected to our giving and that it is God’s will that we prosper.

1 Love must motivate the believer’s giving.

1 CORINTHIANS 13:3

3 And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing.

The *New Berkeley Version* says, “*And though I give all my belongings to feed the hungry and surrender my body to be burned, but I have no love, I am not in the least benefited.*”

2 Paul and John encouraged Christian charity among the brethren.

GALATIANS 6:10

10 As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith.

1 JOHN 3:17-18

17 But whoso hath this world’s good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?

18 My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth.

3 Believers are not to love or trust in money.

1 TIMOTHY 6:6-10, 17-18

6 But godliness with contentment is great gain.

7 For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out.

8 And having food and raiment let us be therewith content.

9 But they that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition.

10 For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows. . . .

17 Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not highminded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy;

18 That they do good, that they be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate.

4 God wants His children to prosper.

3 JOHN 2

2 Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth.

Some have argued that the phrase “*that thou mayest prosper*” does not refer to financial prosperity. However, the Greek word translated “prosper” and “prospereth” is *euodoo*, which means “a good road” or “a good journey.” At the very least, this phrase means to have a good and prosperous journey.

No one can have a good and prosperous journey if he is broke and in want every step of the way. Wouldn’t the wish for someone to have a prosperous journey include his having enough resources to travel safely and comfortably?

Besides, the word translated “prosper” here is the same Greek word Paul used in First Corinthians 16:2, where he instructed believers to set aside money each week “as God hath prospered him.” So the word prosper can certainly and without doubt be used—and is used—in reference to financial prosperity.

I believe this verse clearly means that God wants His children to prosper materially, physically, and spiritually.♥

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MAINTAINING JOY IN EVERY SEASON

EVERY DAY, WE are faced with opportunities to lose our joy. It can be as simple as a rude comment, an unexpected bill, or an unkind act. Or it can be as serious as a bad doctor's report, job loss, or broken relationship. The enemy uses these situations to steal our peace. But God has given us the ability to maintain joy no matter what comes our way.

JOY OVER FEAR

The first step in guarding our joy is to recognize fear. Fear is one of the enemy's main weapons. It creeps in through worry, dread, and what-ifs. But Psalm 91:1 gives us a powerful promise: "*Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High*

will rest in the shadow of the Almighty" (NIV). This psalm reminds us that God protects us from danger, pestilence, and every trap of the enemy. When fear rises, we can speak these words out loud. The Word of God drives out fear and fills our hearts with peace.

JOY THROUGH FORGIVENESS

Another thief of joy is offense. When someone hurts us, it is tempting to hold on to bitterness. But offense will weigh us down and rob us of strength. Jesus warned that offenses will come, but we have the power to choose forgiveness. Forgiveness doesn't mean we approve of wrong actions. It means we release them to God and

refuse to carry the burden. As we let go of unforgiveness, joy flows again. Our hearts are free, and our minds are clear to hear from the Holy Spirit.

JOY IN THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Holy Spirit plays a vital role in helping us keep our joy. Galatians 5:22 tells us that joy is a fruit of the Spirit. It grows in us as we walk in step with Him. Sometimes we try to produce joy by our own effort, but that only leads to frustration. True joy comes as we yield to God and let His Spirit work in us. When we spend time in prayer, worship, and the Word, the Holy Spirit fills us afresh. Our hearts are lifted, and His joy becomes our strength.

JOY WITHOUT COMPARISON

Comparison is another trap that steals joy. In our world of social media and constant updates, it is easy to look at what others are doing and feel like we don't measure up. But God never called us to copy someone else's path.

He has a unique plan for every believer. Jeremiah 29:11 reminds us, *"For I know the plans I have for you . . . plans to give you hope and a future"* (NIV). When we focus on God's plan for us, we stop comparing and start rejoicing in who He made us to be.

JOY IN RIGHT THINKING

Maintaining joy also means choosing our thoughts carefully. Philippians 4:8 urges us to think about things that are true, noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable, excellent, and praiseworthy.

Our thought life sets the tone for our emotions. If we dwell on negativity, fear, and offense, our joy will drain away. But when we meditate on God's promises and remember His goodness, joy

rises up again. We can make a habit of replacing every negative thought with a scripture of hope.

JOY IN EVERY SEASON

The Apostle Paul is one of the greatest examples of joy in the midst of hardship. He wrote some of his most encouraging letters from prison. He declared, *"Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!"* (Phil. 4:4 NIV). Paul understood that joy is not based on outward circumstances but on our inward connection with Christ. We, too, can rejoice in every season because our hope is in the Lord, not in the world.

Finally, we must remember that joy is a decision. It doesn't happen automatically. When challenges come, we can either give in to despair or choose to rejoice. Nehemiah 8:10 tells us, *"The joy of the Lord is your strength."* When we choose joy, we tap into God's strength. He empowers us to overcome every obstacle.

CHOOSE JOY TODAY

Friend, you don't have to let the enemy steal your joy. No matter what you are facing today—fear, offense, comparison, or hardship—you can stand strong in God's promises. Choose to rejoice. Speak His Word. Stay connected to the Holy Spirit. As you do, His joy will sustain you, strengthen you, and carry you through every season of life.♥

Be Led By Truth

IN THIS ERA, people have made truth relative to the situation they are in. But truth is not relative—it’s absolute. I like to say that it is stationary. It doesn’t move. To get closer to the truth, I have to change my position.

How do we recognize truth? Jesus said that God will give us *“another Helper . . . the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him, for He dwells with you and will be in you”* (John 14:16–17 NKJV).

tween truth and God’s Word. Jesus said, *“If you abide in My word, you are My disciples indeed. And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free”* (John 8:31–32 NKJV).

If I want to be led by truth, I have to get into the Word. Then I can know the truth and be free. That’s a different narrative than what the world has! People without God say the Bible is too restrictive—that they can’t live or move in its truths and have freedom. But when you know the truth, that

knowledge frees you!

As Christians, we *know* the Spirit of Truth. We carry it! God’s power and knowledge are within us! We find core truths in God’s Word and have the opportunity to hear His voice within us. Jesus explained it to Pilate like this: *“For this cause I was born, and for this cause I have come into the world, that I should bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the truth hears My voice”* (John 18:37 NKJV).

So if I am not walking in truth, guess what I have a hard time hearing? God’s voice! But if I am operating within truth, I can hear His voice anytime, anywhere. Even at McDonald’s, the voice of the Lord can say, “Put that Big Mac away!” It’s up to me to listen and obey or override His instructions and eat the hamburger anyway.

“If you love Me, keep My commandments” (John 14:15 NKJV). Jesus said that right before He talked about the Spirit of Truth (vv. 16–17). Our love language to God is doing what He says. But we sometimes get it mixed up. We flip what Jesus said in verse 15 and think we have to keep God’s commandments before He will love us. No! God loves every person whether or not they serve Him. That is absolute truth and that small difference can set people free.

We are obligated to ask God, “What do You want me to do?” He has detailed instructions for us to follow. Read what God said to Noah in Genesis 6:14–16. Guess what you’ll find? Boring details! Why is that important? Noah was in a position to hear every detail! He built a boat in a place where there were no boats. There was no YouTube video for him to watch. Noah had to get his directions from God.

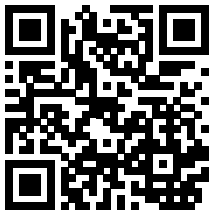
Are you in a position to be led like that? Can you hear the details? Are you ready to follow a plan where all your directions come from God? I challenge you to get ready! Go to the Creator and figure out what He wants you to do. Then walk out the details He gives you and make an impact on the world!♥

IN EVERY GENERATION, people of faith face the same choice: will you keep believing God, or will you give up? Many start out with excitement and passion, trusting God for His promises. But as time passes and answers don't come as quickly as they expect, discouragement sets in. Some stop praying, stop reading the Word, and even stop attending church. They begin to live far below the level God intends.

The Bible gives us a clear encouragement in Galatians 6:9: *“Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up”* (NIV). Every minute you stay in faith, you are a minute closer to receiving what God promised. But if you quit, you stop the blessing in its tracks.

Think of how we approach natural work. If your employer pays you once a month, you don't quit the job after the first week simply because payday hasn't arrived. You know that payday is coming. Spiritually, it's the same. We must refuse to faint, because payday—the day when God's promise shows up—is always on its way.

FAITH THAT ENDURES

God has given us examples in Scripture of men and women who refused to quit. Abraham is one of the greatest. Romans 4:18–21 tells us that *“against all hope, Abraham in hope believed”* (NIV). Even when he was nearly 100 years old, and Sarah's

womb was barren, Abraham held fast to God’s promise. He grew stronger in faith and gave glory to God, *“being fully persuaded that God had power to do what he had promised.”*

Abraham waited twenty-five years for the fulfillment of God’s promise. Imagine the opportunities he had to give up! But instead, he chose to keep looking at the stars and the sand—reminders of God’s Word to him that his descendants would be countless. Though he saw nothing in the natural, he stayed persuaded. And in time, Isaac was born.

Abraham’s story reminds us that delay is not denial. Just because the promise tarries does not mean it won’t come. Faith endures through seasons of waiting, trusting that God is faithful to perform His Word.

THE FARMER’S LESSON

My grandfather farmed cotton in north central Texas. He knew the rhythms of planting and harvest. After preparing the soil, plowing the fields, and planting seed, he didn’t complain two weeks later when no crop had yet appeared. He understood every seed has a season, and harvest always comes at the proper time.

It’s the same spiritually. When we sow the Word of God into our hearts, it may not look like anything is happening at first. But that seed is alive and working. In time, it will produce a harvest—if we do not quit.

Even a rose bush gives us a lesson. When it is first planted, it looks like nothing more than sticks and thorns. But if it is tended, before long, beautiful roses appear. Some promises of God are like that rose bush. At first glance, nothing looks encouraging. But with time and persistence, beauty begins to bloom.

STRENGTHENED BY THE WORD

The Word of God is our unfailing source of strength. When we continually confess the Word, we are not weakening—we are growing stronger. Our confession keeps the promise alive in our hearts and gives us endurance. It keeps us looking forward to the day when we will see God’s faithfulness in full display.

Romans 10:17 says, *“Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God”* (NKJV). Every time we read, speak, and

meditate on God’s Word, faith rises. And that faith is what sustains us until payday arrives.

LEARNING FROM ABRAHAM

Abraham’s faith is not just a Bible story. Galatians 3:29 tells us that *“if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham’s seed, and heirs according to the promise”* (NIV). That means his story is our story. The same faith that sustained Abraham is the faith that belongs to us in Christ. And the same God who fulfilled His Word to Abraham will fulfill His Word to us.

What was the key to Abraham’s strength? He didn’t deny the natural facts—he knew his body was as good as dead. But he did not let the facts weaken his faith. He chose to focus on God’s promise instead of his circumstances. Abraham grew stronger in faith by giving glory to God, fully persuaded that God was able.

We too must fix our attention on the promises of God, not on the challenges we face. The enemy would like nothing better than for us to faint and give up. But if we stand firm and keep praising God, we will grow strong in faith. And payday will come.

FULLY PERSUADED

The call today is simple: don’t faint, and don’t give up. The enemy wants you to grow weary, but God wants you to grow strong. As you stay with the Word, your faith will be strengthened. Keep looking at His promises. Keep confessing His truth. Keep giving Him glory. And like Abraham, you will see God’s faithfulness.

No matter how long the season may seem, payday is coming. Harvest is certain for those who refuse to quit. Fight the good fight of faith, hold fast to God’s promises, and stay fully persuaded. God will do exactly what He said He would do. ♡

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4 STEPS TO ANSWERED PRAYER

Faithfully following these steps will
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answered prayer.



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LEARNING HOW TO pray effectively is one of the most important things believers can ever do in their Christian walk. Really, we cannot be successful in fulfilling God's purpose in our lives if we do not know how to pray according to biblical principles.

Our prayer life should rest on God's Word. This article covers four principles of prayer found in His Word. As you learn these principles, determine to get them into your heart so you can put them into practice in your own private prayer life. I started doing this as a young man, and I have received answers to my prayers ever since then. These steps will help all believers receive answers to their prayers.

Be Specific and Stand on God's Promises

Here is one step to answered prayer: decide what you want from God and find the scripture or scriptures that promise you these things.

So many times we are indefinite in our praying. I would rather folks pray two or three minutes and know what they're praying about than pray two or three hours and not know.

Sometimes when I ask people what they are praying about, they say they don't know. I asked one person what he was praying about, and he said he was praying just to be praying!

I realize there is one kind of prayer whereby we pray to have

fellowship with God. However, here I am talking about praying specifically to receive an answer to prayer. If we are not careful, fellowship with God will spill over into the kind of praying that seeks specific answers.

One time, a certain minister asked me to pray for him. I asked him what he wanted me to pray for, and he said he didn't know. Now, if you went to a grocery store and pushed your cart up and down the aisles, but didn't buy anything, people would think something was wrong with you!

On the other hand, if someone went to the store to buy a few things, and he bought just those things, you wouldn't think anything was wrong. In fact, you could say he was being definite in his actions. In the same way, decide what you want from God and be definite about it. Then find scriptures from the Word that promise you whatever it is you want. Be specific in your praying.

You Must Ask God for What You Want

A second step to answered prayer is to ask God for the things you want and believe that you receive them.

Certainly, God knows what we need even before we ask. The Bible says, "*Your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things*" (Matt. 6:32). But we're also told to ask for what we need. To say that we're leaving it up to God and that we know He will automatically do whatever is best is unscriptural. Jesus Himself said we are to ask God for what we need.

JOHN 16:23–24

23 And in that day ye shall ask me nothing. Verily, verily, I say unto you, Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my name, he will give it you.

24 Hitherto have ye asked nothing in my name: ask, and ye shall receive, that your joy may be full.

MATTHEW 7:7–8

7 Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you:

8 For every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened.

MARK 11:24

24 Therefore I say unto you, What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them.

Be Positive in Your Thinking

A third step to answered prayer is to let every thought affirm that you have what you asked for.

After you pray in faith according to God's Word, never permit a picture of failure to remain in your mind. Once you've prayed and asked God for something, never doubt that you have the answer. If doubts persist, rebuke them. Get your mind on the answer. To do that, you will have to get your mind on the Word. The Bible says, "*Resist the devil, and he will flee from you*" (James 4:7). Doubt is from the devil.

To receive answers to your prayers, you must eradicate every image, suggestion, vision, and all other thoughts that do not contribute to your faith. You have to stay positive in your thinking.

Guard Your Mind

A fourth step to answered prayer is this: guard against every evil thought that tries to make you doubt God's Word.

Thoughts are governed by observation, association, and teaching. So this step relates to step number three. The Bible says we are to cast down every imagination that exalts itself against the knowledge of God (2 Cor. 10:5). That's why you should stay away from all places and things that do not support your affirmation that God has answered your prayer.

The Bible tells us in Philipians chapter 4 exactly what to think on.

PHILIPPIANS 4:8

8 Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are TRUE, whatsoever things are HONEST, whatsoever things are JUST, whatsoever things are PURE, whatsoever things are LOVELY, whatsoever things are OF GOOD REPORT; if there be ANY VIRTUE, and if there be ANY PRAISE, think on these things.

Many people are thinking on the wrong things, and they're defeated in life as a result. But guard against every evil thought and think only on those things which affirm that God has heard and answered your prayers. If you do that, you will be cooperating with God in faith. You will have to guard your mind in order to develop in faith. And as you stand your ground firm in faith, your faith will see you through to victory!

To receive answers to your prayers, first decide what you want from God and then find scriptures for what you need. Next, ask God for those things and, when you pray, believe that you receive them. Let every thought affirm that you have what you've asked for. And guard your mind against every evil thought. Faithfully following these steps will move you along the path to answered prayer.♥

A FRESH START WITH A LISTENING HEART

EVERY NEW YEAR offers us an opportunity to pause, reflect, and realign. As one year ends and a new one begins, it's natural to think about what went well and what didn't. Some look back with gratitude for victories and answered prayers. Others recall disappointments, losses, or things that didn't happen as hoped. But whether the year had mountain-top moments or valleys, one thing is certain—it's behind us now.

Paul said in Philippians 3:13–14, "*Forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.*" That's the attitude we need to carry into this New Year—a determination to look ahead, not behind.

Reflection is valuable when it helps us learn. Remember what God has done for you this past year. Recall His faithfulness, provision, and the ways He sustained you through challenges. But don't dwell on regrets or mistakes. We can't rewrite the past, but we can choose how we walk into the future. God doesn't want us stuck in yesterday; He wants us to grow into tomorrow.

As you enter this New Year, ask the Lord to show you what to carry forward and what to leave behind. Maybe it's letting go of disappointment over a dream not yet materialized, releasing guilt over something you wish you had done differently, or setting aside old successes—because living in the glow of what God did yesterday can keep us from seeing what He wants to do today.

This New Year is a blank canvas, and God is the Master Artist. He already has a plan for your days—plans for good, not for harm; plans to prosper you and give you a future and a hope (Jeremiah 29:11). But to walk in that plan, we must make time to hear His voice. Too often, we rush ahead with our own ideas or get distracted by busyness. God doesn't shout over the noise; He whispers to hearts that are still and listening.

I encourage you to set aside moments of quiet each day to listen for His direction. Start each morning by saying, "Lord, what do You want me to focus on today? Who do You want me to encourage? What steps should I take toward the dream You've placed in my heart?" As you develop that habit, you'll find that His guidance becomes clearer, and your days begin to carry a divine rhythm.

It's also beneficial to set both spiritual and practical goals. Write them down and pray over them. Maybe your goals include reading the Bible more, helping at your church, or building stronger relationships. On the practical side, maybe you want to manage time better, live with more purpose, or take better care of your body, which is the temple of the Holy Spirit. Remember, spiritual growth and practical wisdom go hand in hand.

Here are some thoughts to help you move forward in God's plan this year: Begin with prayer. Before making resolutions, make sure your heart aligns with God's will. Ask Him to show you where to invest your time, talents, and energy. Release the past. You can't move forward while staring in the rearview mirror. Release hurts, disappointments, and past victories that cause you to look backward.

Be intentional. Growth doesn't happen by accident. Schedule time with God, plan moments of rest, and make space for what truly matters. Walk in gratitude. A thankful heart attracts God's presence. Begin and end each day by thanking Him for His blessings, both seen and unseen. Stay connected. Surround yourself with people who strengthen your faith and speak life into your calling.

When you look at the year ahead, don't let fear or uncertainty hold you back. The same God who walked with you last year will walk with you this year—and every year after. He already knows what's ahead, and His grace is sufficient for every step.

So, as you move forward, hold tight to Paul's words: "*This one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before*" (Phil. 3:13). The past is a teacher, not a destination. The present is an opportunity. And the future is a promise waiting to unfold. Step boldly into it, knowing that God's plan for your life is still in motion. Let this be the year you walk closely with Him—listening, trusting, and following His voice one step at a time.♥
